JAVA

A Pure Object Oriented Language

The growth of Java during last few years has been phenomenal. It has now emerged as the language of choice of the world computing community due to its simplicity, portability and security. Java, the only pure object oriented programming language available today, is now used in almost all applications from simple home application control systems to complex space control systems. It has also revolutionized application development for Internet and intranets.

Java's motto is "Write once, Run anywhere" in order to accomplish this Java has undergone many improvements and enhancements during these years

of growth and popularity.

To build today's complex software it is just not enough to put together a sequence of programming statements and sets of procedures and modules. Since the invention of computing, many programming approaches have been tried. These include techniques such as modular programming top down, bottom up and structured programming. The primary motivation in each case has been concerned to handle the increasing complexity of programs that are reliable and maintainable.

Object Oriented Programming (OOP) is an

approach to program organization and development that attempts to eliminate some of the pit falls of conventional programming method by incorporating the best of structured programming features with several new concepts. It is a new way of organizing and developing programs and has nothing to do with any particular language.

However not all language are suitable to

implement the OOP concept easily. Languages that support OOP feature include small talk, objective C, C++ ADA and Object Pascal, C++, an extension of C language, is the most popular OOP language today. C++ is basically procedural language with Object Oriented extension. The latest one added to this list is JAVA, a pure object oriented language.
